The Board of Directors, in collaboration with the President & CEO and leadership team, are pleased to present this 2018/19 Annual report, informing our patients, their families and the public we serve of the many successes at SHHA this past year. This would not be possible without the tremendous hard work and dedication of the staff and physicians to our "Little Hospital That Does."

We are pleased to report that the hospital ended the fiscal year with a surplus from operations. This is due to the continued cost containment efforts, which focused on partnerships and collaboration, in addition to the dedication of staff, physicians, and volunteers who contribute and support hospital operations every day.

The Board, Staff and Physicians thank both the South Huron Hospital Auxiliary and South Huron Hospital Foundation for their significant contributions. The Auxiliary, through their bi-annual Rummage Sale and Gift Shop, have contributed \$37,184 of support through the Foundation. The Foundation, through the community and donors, provided financial support of over \$690,000 towards patient care equipment, including new state of the art Diagnostic Imaging equipment. The continued support of the SHHA Auxiliary and SHHA Foundation play a significant role in supporting our ability to provide the highest quality healthcare to the patients we serve!

As we move into the 2019/20 term, the healthcare system remains in a state of flux with the province gearing up for the development of Ontario Health Teams. The SHHA Board and leadership team remains committed to sustainability, through continuous collaboration efforts in order to create efficiencies and maintain high quality of care to our patients, while doing so within the level of resources available.

Reflecting on our Mission, Vision & Values and Strategic Plan for the past year....



1. Focus on Safe, Quality Patient Care, Close to Home

- Patient & Family Advisory Council (PFAC) engaged in project to determine patient entertainment needs while in hospital and in the development of SHHA's Quality Improvement Plan (QIP).
- Alternate Level of Care (ALC) SHHA was interviewed and featured in HQO's Quorum to outline strategies that have helped keep ALC levels lower than provincial levels.
- Mental Health hosted AMGH mental health lead at SHHA to review practices and processes involved in transferring
 mental health patients; attended by nursing, social work, and physicians. Dr. Ken Milne, Chief of Staff continues to work
 collaboratively with our partners in an effort to improve access to mental health services.
- **eConsults** -- The MDs at the Family Practice Clinic have concentrated on ensuring they have their "ONEid Credentials" from eHealth Ontario secured. This enables them to participate in eConsults with specialists right across the province.

2. Focus on our People & Workplace

- Human Resources a full-time, on-site Human Resources Associate was recruited in the fall of 2018.
- Staff Appreciation Holiday Luncheon/service award presentations, Summer Appreciation BBQ, Out of Outbreak celebration, Nurse's Week





- Workplace Violence Risk Assessment (WVRAT) assessments for all areas of the hospital have been completed in accordance with The Occupational Health and Safety Act (OHSA) recommendations to assess and control risks of workplace violence and to ensure that organizational policies and programs continue to protect workers. SHHA's Joint Health & Safety Committee drove the assessments and action planning.
 - ⇒ Concerted efforts and investments have been made to improve staff safety, including:
 - ⇒ **Behaviour Safety Alerts** Visible cues are now evident in patient care areas where risks to staff safety have been identified related to patient (and visitor) behaviours.
 - ⇒ "Working Alone" policy and procedure.
 - ⇒ **Staff Education** offered an education event for all staff ("Fall fer All") focusing on effective communications, conflict management, situational awareness and staff safety (as well as Huron County's Opioid Drug Strategy focusing on awareness and education, stigma, and harm reduction (instructed by Michelle Carter from Public Health). A further two education sessions were held focusing on self-defense techniques and practical application of disengagement and de-escalation strategies in a healthcare setting.
 - ⇒ Security camera enhancements and increases in controls for after-hours access (e.g. to basement at night)

3. Focus on Increasing the Value of Our Healthcare System

- **Diagnostic Imaging (DI) Equipment** fully deployed and signed-off new DI equipment—generously funded by the Foundation.
- OTN (Ontario Telemedicine Network) a needs assessment and space redesign planning has been completed to support OTN for patient care and corporate use.
- Health Infrastructure Renewal Fund- Exceptional Circumstance Projects (HIRF-ECP) projects totalling ~\$423K have been completed by the March 31st deadline, on budget. Improvements are evident in: roof repairs/replacement, exterior doors, roof top heating unit (RTUs), ED ambulance sliding doors, access control & fire alarm panel/remote monitoring panel as well as asbestos abatement (ceiling tiles) in several areas.

4. Focus on Working with Partners towards an Integrated & Sustainable Rural Health Care System



- Police Met to evaluate increasing demand for mental health calls in the community and presentations to the hospital Emergency Department for mental health conditions. Further, there is continued engagement with OPP to evaluate our Code Silver (weapon) policy/protocol and to plan for a mock drill.
- South Huron Business & Community Excellence Award SHHA was nominated for this award.
- Elementary School SHHA hosted two kindergarten classes from Precious Blood Elementary School to watch the "robot" take an x-ray and experience Dr. Milne applying and removing a cast.
- Nurse Navigator with GBACHC Hosted Megan Elliott, Nurse Navigator, at SHHA to meet with staff and increase awareness of services and potential collaborations.
- Connected Rural Communities Collaborative in the fall of 2018, the Grand Bend Area CHC and partners (including SHHA) launched a new project to reduce social isolation. Social inclusion is an important determinant of health.
- The Huron Perth Centre and Family Crisis Counselling Services have begun to use space at South Huron Medical Centre to meet with families from the South end of the county rather than having the patients drive to Clinton.
- Huron County Health Unit Substance Management Working Group -- SHHA continues to be a part of the Huron County
 Health Unit Substance Management Working Group to contribute to the county-wide opioid drug strategy and action
 plan.
- Bluewater Area Family Health Team in Zurich -- In order to provide greater
 access to services and support beyond the time-limited support that SHHA can
 provide, Rossana Sabalones, BSW, MBSW, from Bluewater Area Family Health
 Team in Zurich will be offering counselling and support services to the community from within the South Huron Medical Centre.
- South Huron Medical Centre Partnering for Quality (PFQ) Projects
- **Discovery Week Acknowledgement** representatives from the Office of Distributed Education Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry at Western University made a site visit to SHHA/South Huron Medical Centre in early October to acknowledge the exceptional experience offered to first year medical students as part of Schulich's "Discovery Week." We owe a debt of gratitude to our "volunteer extraordinaire" Joanne Bowen as well as Heather Klopp, Director of Ambulatory Services, who are dedicated to this project each year.
- Health & Wellness Forum Heather Klopp, Jessie Brown (Social Work), and Sherri Penn (ED Nurse) set up a booth and were featured speakers at the Municipality of South Huron Health and Wellness Forum in September.



INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Governors and Members of the South Huron Hospital Association

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the South Huron Hospital Association ("the Hospital"), which are comprised of the balance sheet as at March 31, 2019 and the operating fund statement of revenue and expenses, statement of remeasurement gains and losses and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Hospital as at March 31, 2019, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards (PSAB).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Hospital in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with PSAB, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Hospital's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Hospital or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Hospital's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

 audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of
 not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from
 error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the
 override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an
 opinion on the effectiveness of the Hospital's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Hospital's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Hospital to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the consolidated financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the consolidated financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

1. Significant accounting policies

Nature of organization

The South Huron Hospital Association ("Hospital") is principally involved in providing health care services to the residents of the South Huron and surrounding municipalities. The Hospital is incorporated without share capital under the Corporations Act (Ontario) and is a charitable organization within the meaning of the Income Tax Act (Canada).

Basis of presentation

The financial statements of the Hospital have been prepared in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards for government not-for-profit organizations, including the 4200 series of standards, as issued by the Public Sector Accounting Board ("PSAB for Government NPOs").

Revenue recognition

The Hospital follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions which include donations and government grants.

Under the Health Insurance Act and Regulations thereto, the Hospital is funded primarily by the Province of Ontario in accordance with budget arrangements established by the Ministry of Health. Operating grants are recorded as revenue in the period to which they relate. Grants approved but not received at the end of an accounting period are accrued. Where a portion of a grant relates to a future period, it is deferred and recognized in that subsequent period.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Externally restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are recognized. Contributions restricted for the purchase of capital assets are deferred and amortized into revenue on a straight-line basis, at a rate corresponding with the amortization rate for the related capital assets.

Contributed services

The Hospital is dependent on the voluntary services of many individuals. Since these services are not normally purchased by the hospital and because of the difficulty in estimating their fair market value, these services are not recorded in these financial statements.

Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. Betterments which extend the estimated life of an asset are capitalized. When a capital asset no longer contributes to the hospital's ability to provide services, its carrying amount is written down to its residual value. Amortization is provided on assets placed into use on the straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Land improvements10 - 20 yearsBuildings50 yearsBuilding service equipment20 - 25 yearsEquipment3 - 25 years

Vacation pay

Vacation pay is accrued for all employees as entitlements to these payments is earned.

Deferred building and equipment grants

Provincial and municipal building and equipment grants and donations received by the hospital are deferred and amortized on a straight-line basis at a rate corresponding with the depreciation rate for the related building or equipment.

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reported period. These estimates are reviewed periodically, and, as adjustments become necessary, they are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known.

1. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Investments

The Hospital has classified all stocks, bonds and other investment securities as available-for-sale which are carried at fair value. Bank guaranteed investment certificates are classified as held-to-maturity and are carried at cost. A write down of the carrying amount of held-to-maturity investments is charged against income when evidence indicates a permanent decline in the underlying value and earning power of an investment. Gains and losses on disposal of held-to-maturity investments are determined on a completed transaction basis.

6. Pension plan

Full-time and part-time employees of the hospital may be eligible to be members of the Hospitals of Ontario Pension Plan which is a multi-employer final average pay contributory pension plan. Employer contributions made to the plan during the year by the hospital amounted to \$423,947 (2018: \$395,316). These amounts are included in expenses in the operating fund statement of revenue and expenses and fund balance.

7. Employee future benefits

The Hospital accrues its obligations under employee benefit plans and the related costs. The Hospital has adopted the policy that the cost of retirement benefits earned by employees is actuarially determined using the projected unit method pro-rated on service and management's best estimate of salary escalation (where applicable), retirement ages of employees and expected health care costs.

The Hospital provides extended health care, dental and life insurance benefits to substantially all full-time employees.

At March 31, 2019, the Hospital's accrued benefit obligation relating to post-retirement benefit plans is \$876,500 (2018: \$857,500).

8. Financial instruments

The Hospital's financial instruments consist of cash and short-term investments, accounts receivable and accounts payable. It is management's opinion that the Hospital is not exposed to significant interest and credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of the financial instruments approximates their carrying amount.

9. Disclosure of economic interest

The South Huron Hospital Foundation (the "Foundation") is incorporated without share capital under the laws of the Province of Ontario and is a registered foundation under the Income Tax Act (Canada). The Foundation was established to receive and maintain a fund or funds and to apply from time to time all or part thereof for charitable purposes carried on by, in connection with, in relation to, for the benefit of or to enhance or improve the health care services in the area serviced by the South Huron Hospital and to do all such things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of these objectives. The Foundation is managed and controlled independent of the Hospital.

During the year ended March 31, 2019, the Foundation provided donations totalling \$368,941 (2018: \$1,165,540) to the Hospital.

10. Commitments on unrestricted net assets

During the year, the Board of Directors committed \$635,366 (2018: \$688,500) of unrestricted net assets for specific capital development. These internally committed amounts are not available for other purposes without approval by the Board of Directors.

11. Financial risks and concentration of credit risks

Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterpart may default on its contractual obligations resulting in a financial loss. The Hospital is exposed to credit risk with respect to the accounts receivable.

The Hospital assesses, on a continuous basis, accounts receivable and provides for any amounts that are not collectible in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The maximum exposure to credit risk of the Hospital at March 31, 2019 is the carrying value of these assets.

The carrying amount of accounts receivable is valued with consideration for an allowance for doubtful accounts. The amount of any related impairment loss is recognized in the operating fund statement of revenue and expenses. Subsequent recoveries of impairment losses related to accounts receivable are credited to the operating fund statement of revenue and expenses. The balance of the allowance for doubtful accounts at March 31, 2019 is \$2,383 (2018: \$4,607).

There have been no significant changes to the credit risk exposure from 2018.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Hospital will be unable to fulfill its obligations on a timely basis or at a reasonable cost. The Hospital manages its liquidity risk by monitoring its operating requirements. The Hospital prepares budget and cash forecasts to ensure it has sufficient funds to fulfill its obligations.

There have been no significant changes to the liquidity risk exposure from 2018.

Market risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices, such as foreign exchange rates or interest rates will affect the Hospital's income or the value of its holdings of financial instruments. The objective of market risk management is to control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters while optimizing return on investments.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows or a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in the market interest rates.

There has been no change to the interest rate risk exposure from 2018.
